Taking this premise, the course aims to accustom the students with advanced knowledge and ability to use those concepts of rural urban interrelationship. The course is organized in five different units starting with the concept of rural urban linkage. The second unit concerns with rural urban linkage theories and models. Likewise, the third unit deals with methods and tools of rural urban linkage. The fourth unit discusses about Small Scale Enterprises and fifth unit deals with the Plan, policies and programs along with effectiveness of few selected program focused on strengthening interrelationship between rural and urban in South Asia and Nepal.

Course Objectives:

- To enable the student about concept, issues, guiding principles and constraints regarding rural urban linkage.
- To enable the students understanding basic theoretical framework, technique and tools and their implications in rural urban interrelationship
- To enable the student about small scale enterprises and its role in rural urban linkage
- To understand the efforts of South Asia and Nepal in strengthening rural urban linkage in different periodic plans via several mission/programs/project

- Students will be able to conceptualize the idea of rural-urban linkage ---its meaning and contexts to foster the perspective of development studies
